#### Greetings

from the executive officers of the Poe Studies Association. Organized in December 1972, the PSA joins seven similar societies affiliated with MLA: the Paul Claudel Society, the Dante Society of America, the Dickens Society, the Melville Society, the Milton Society of America, the Pirandello Society, and the John Steinbeck Society.

Because the PSA will not begin to collect dues until 1974, it has no treasury with which to meet the cost of this Newsletter. Accordingly, the executive officers gratefully acknowledge the financial assistance given by Holy Cross College and the clerical aid provided by the University of Connecticut.

#### Secretary's Report

The MLA sponsored 119 seminars at its 1972 convention in New York. None of them, however, was more faithful to the origins of the word, more genuinely seminal in character, than the one devoted to Poe. For the thirty-nine persons who gathered at that seminar convened as a committee of organization with the purpose of founding an association of Poe scholars.

The seminar met at 8:30 a.m. on 30 December with Professor Eric Carlson presiding and with Professor John Reilly appointed to keep the minutes.

Professor Carlson opened the proceedings by reading a tentative statement of the purpose of the proposed organization:

In general, to further the exchange of information and ideas related to research in Poe biography and criticism. More specifically, to encourage co-operative effort in establishing a sense of community among Poe scholars in this country and abroad, in avoiding duplication of scholarly work, in the use of major repositories of Poe manuscripts, and in initiating and sponsoring new research and publication. These purposes will be served by means of a Newsletter and the affiliated journal Poe Studies, by an annual gathering of members and friends in conjunction with the MLA meetings, by special conferences, and by co-operation with several Poe societies and Poe libraries.

Though the ensuing discussion was wide ranging, it did lead to three resolutions: (1) that the organization should, at least tentatively, call itself the Poe Studies Association, (2) that it should not collect dues until after it has established itself more formally at its meeting in December, 1973, and (3) that those persons present should appoint an executive committee of two to serve as the executive officers of the organization for one year. These executive officers were charged with (a) drafting a set of by-laws to be presented for consideration at the meeting in December of 1973, (b) arranging the time and place for the December meeting, (c) appointing a nominating committee to draw up a slate of officers to be voted upon at the December meeting, and (d) issuing a newsletter as a means of keeping in touch with those persons present at the seminar and of reaching prospective members. For 1973 Professors Carlson and Reilly were unanimously appointed executive officers, president and secretary respectively. Helpful advice and offers of cooperation, much appreciated, were contributed by Mr. Richard Hart, representing the Poe Society of Baltimore; Professor Hennig Cohen, secretary for the Melville Society; and Professor G. R. Thompson, editor of Poe Studies.

After the business of organizing the Association a brief discussion followed on current Poe scholarship. Mention was made of recent and forthcoming publications by Professors J. Lasley Dameron, G. R. Thompson, Stuart Levine, and Patricia Smith; of work in progress by Professors Burton Pollin, Evelyn Hinz, John Reilly; and dissertations by John Hussey, Liahna Babener, John G. Kennedy, and Judy Osowski-Bierbaum.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 o'clock.

News Items (The editors invite any Poe-related news items.)

Mrs. Edward T. Wilcox, Humanities Editor of the Harvard University Press, has informed the Newsletter that Professor Burton Pollin will edit the last three volumes of the six-volume Mabbot edition of The Collected Works of Edgar Allan Poe. A well-known Poe scholar, Professor Pollin is the author of numerous articles, the compiler of the Dictionary of Names and Titles in Poe's Collected Works, and the author of Discoveries in Poe.

Professor Mabbott had "all but finished" preparing Volume I (the poems) before his death in May of 1968. It was published less than a year later. Volumes II and III (the tales and sketches) are expected to be released in the winter of 1974-75. Based upon Professor Mabbott's notes, they are being edited by Eleanor D. Kewer of the Harvard University Press with the assistance of Mrs. Mabbott and Mrs. Francis Clyne. Professor Pollin's editorial work will include the longer narratives and practical criticism and his critical essays in Volumes V and VI. One of these last two volumes will also carry a listing of all the printed in this edition.

After five years of waiting and speculating, it is welcome news, indeed, that someone as competent as Professor Pollin has been chosen to edit these three crucial volumes. It is not welcome, however, to be reminded that Harvard University Press is publishing a "collected works" rather than a complete edition.

Professor Pollin himself provides another news item. He informs us that he is the receipent of a Guggenheim Fellowship for 1973-74 which will enable him to pursue research on a book of studies of Poe's style (including his coinages), of his response to the art and artists of his day, of his relation to the music of his time, of his reviewers, and of the necrology of Poe. He has our best wishes.
